Project Gutenberg www.gutenberg.org (US) http://www.gutenberg.ca (Canada) http://gutenberg.net.au (Australia)	There are more than 50, 000 older books and some images from books.
The National Aeronautics and Space Administration also called NASA www.nasa.gov	There are many pictures of rockets, planets and stars. There is also a lot of technical and scientific information.
The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's National Digital Library digitalmedia.fws.gov	There are many pictures of wild animals and places. There are also some sound/video recordings, maps and scientific documents.
LibriVox librivox.org	They produce and publish audio recordings of public domain books. This is a very useful resource for the blind.
Europeana Collections http://www.europeana.eu	It is an online collection of millions of digitized objects of art from European museums, libraries and archives. I do not know if the English language resources and interface will survive Brexit.
Central Intelligence Agency also called the CIA www.cia.gov/library/publications/the-world-factbook/	The World Factbook is an atlas and geo-political encyclopaedia. It contains maps, flags, local pictures and statistical information. There is a political bias.
Department of Agriculture www.usda.gov	They have many pictures of farms, plants and animals. There is also a lot of technical information related to farming and food.
Google Books books.google.com	This is a massive book index. There are PDFs of public domain books available for download. Books under copyright are also indexed, but only limited views are available. There is some overlap with the venerable Project Gutenberg.
University of Oxford Text Archive http://ota.ox.ac.uk/tcp/	They have thousands of books found nowhere else in more than 25 different languages and are steadily adding more texts. Some texts are for researchers and not available to the public. However you are likely to be given e-copies of them if you ask nicely.
